*Crossing the border from Germany into France represents so much more than a change in jurisdiction or a more sophisticated wine marketing strategy. France is the center of the wine universe and has been since the fall of the Roman Empire. When it comes to wine, France is the Monolith and the rest of us are just primates taking our cues according. The French produce a dizzying array of wine styles from noble and neglected grapes alike. Whether you are looking for a crisp and zippy thirst quencher, a richly textured and unctuous sipper or a sophisticated bottle to pair with a cheese plate, France has been perfecting your order for 1,000 years.*

*At Strasbourg we hop over to the western side of the Rhine Valley and find ourselves in the long and skinny region of Alsace at the base of the Vosges Mountains. What is Alsace? German? French? German? French? Neither? Alsatian? The answer is yes to all. This region has been passed back and forth between the two countries so many times that the Alsatians have created their own unique culture and wine styles. Alsace is the Spinal Tap of French whites: full throttled, spicy wines that routinely go up to 11.*

## Loire Valley

After sampling the hedonistic pleasures of Alsace's whites, it's time to head west in search of the perfect oyster wine. We'll start our exploration of the Loire Valley in Nantes, where the Loire River empties into the Atlantic. The Loire Valley is positively massive and before heads rolled during the French Revolution it served as a country getaway for the rich and famous. Everyone had a chateau in the Loire, literally everyone. Kings, queens, dukes, bishops, and even royal mistresses (once they had, uh, "retired") had their own chateau on France's longest river.

### MUSCADET

Wine styles and grape varieties change as we move inland in the Loire Valley. Beginning around the city of Nantes, the Muscadet region produces light and citrusy wines with a distinctive salty aftertaste. Perfect for oysters or patios. In Houston, we think almost every day is a Musca-day!

## Burgundy

*Pardon us for dragging you away from Chablis, but we've only just scraped the tip of the Burgundy iceberg and we have more work to do. Let's head southeast and make a stop in Dijon for a bit of the mustard that carries the city's name and was originally made from the juice of unripe Chardonnay berries from the surrounding vineyards. Today, Dijon mustard is not even produced in Dijon, but we can probably find some Grey Poupon in a corner store.*

*Motoring south out of Dijon on the RN74 (D974 to those of you lacking sentimentality) we are now in the heart of Burgundy, known as the Côte d'Or. This narrow ridge of limestone runs alongside RN74 and is the site of some of the world's most coveted dirt for Chardonnay and Pinot Noir. White Burgundy is in a category all to itself and one of contradictions, at that. Powerful but understated, rich but delicate, seductive but sophisticated are a few that come to mind, but more importantly it seems like a bottle of White Burgundy is empty almost as soon as the cork is pulled, and there's no mystery in that.*

Now, on to the Jura! The Jura region lies in the foothills of the Alps and is almost a mirror image of Burgundy. The limestone formation having been pulled apart by the forces that created the Saône River valley. At The Library, we have a real affection for the idiosyncratic wines of the Jura. We won't even mind if you call them weird.

### VIN JAUNE

Vin Jaune is one of the wildest and most unique wine styles on the planet and is only made in the Jura. Vin Jaune literally means "yellow wine" and is named for the color of the wine after it has aged for 6+ years in partially filled barrels that encourage oxidation. And if that's not weird enough, a thin layer of yeast, called a "veil", is allowed to grow on top of the wine and eat certain nutrients from the wine during the aging process. Vin Jaune is most similar to Sherry, but without the extra alcohol from fortification. The resulting wine smells like a chemistry lab (in a good way, if that's possible), but is so complex and so weird that it is truly one of the world's great wines and intended for contemplation.

Bordeaux

As fun as the Loire Valley can be, it's time to swap our work boots and floppy hats for more sophisticated attire as we head south towards the famous port city on the Atlantic, Bordeaux. There isn't a place more synonymous with wine than Bordeaux. Wines from Bordeaux chateaus have been referenced by name since the 17th century and the amount of ink spilled over the wines ever since could fill an ocean. So, is Bordeaux stuffy, old-fashioned and pretentious? Well, it can be, but it doesn't have to be. The truth is that Bordeaux is really f\*\*\*ing good and its ability to transform with age is magical. Cabernet Sauvignon, Cabernet Franc and Merlot work together in this wet and muddy environment to create something truly special.

Left Bank

Bordeaux is divided into two parts by the Garonne estuary, which opens to the Atlantic. The left, or west, bank is known as the Médoc and is the place where Cabernet Sauvignon was made famous and dominates the blend. The wines are famed for their aging ability and unique gravelly character.

Château Montrose, Saint-Estephe

Château Montrose was built in 1815 on a mound of deep gravel near the Gironde estuary on the left bank of Bordeaux that is known as the Médoc. Montrose was so named due to the flowers that grew on the "mountain" prior to the planting of vines. Leave it to the French sense of poetic license to refer to a hill that is 60 feet high as a "Mont". Dominated by Cabernet Sauvignon, the chateau's wines are big and structured and benefit from a little, or a lot of aging, courtesy of The Library. Perfectly aged Montrose is a revelation and one of our favorite wine experiences.

## Burgundy

Heading east out of Bordeaux, the spire of the Saint Emilion Church still visible in the rearview mirror, you may start to feel your heart flutter in anticipation as we approach our next destination. Burgundy has a tendency to do that. In our last visit to the Cote d'Or, we learned that this is the birthplace of the Chardonnay grape. In a true embarrassment of riches, this is also the birthplace of Pinot Noir, an ancient variety that happens to be a parent of Chardonnay.

Pinot Noir grown in these limestone soils is unlike anything grown in the rest of the world. Compared to the dark, full bodied wines of Bordeaux, red Burgundy is something altogether different. Burgundy is the Bach to Bordeaux's Beethoven, the Cat Stevens to Bordeaux's Mick Jagger, or maybe the Steph Curry to Bordeaux's Lebron. You surely get the point.

Burgundy has hundreds, if not thousands, of individual vineyards that were originally set out by the Benedictine and Cistercian monks in the middle ages. These guys were the most educated agriculturalists of the era and the must have had plenty of time on their hands because they outlined a collection of vineyards that continues to captivate wine lovers today.



The slightly different soils and exposures of each Burgundian village infuse the wines with their own unique character. Full bodied and powerful Gevrey-Chambertin, spicy and sophisticated Vosne-Romanee, delicate and lacy Chambolle-Musigny and the elegant and floral Volnay are just a few examples of Burgundy's remarkable ability to translate a place into your glass.

We are devout worshippers of the Cult of Burgundy here at The Library. There is a red Burgundy for every taste and every season. You'll find wines from most of the villages of the Cote d'Or listed from north to south on the following pages. So go nuts and explore the variety the region can offer. Feel free to grab a book on Burgundy from the shelves and look at a map of the specific vineyard in your glass or read a profile of the producer who made the wine.

If you enjoy California Pinot Noir, you should try a Burgundy. If you drink Bordeaux, you should try a Burgundy. If you like vodka, you should try a Burgundy. If you think you don't like wine, you should try a Burgundy. If you have something to celebrate, you should try a Burgundy. If you're feeling blue, you should try a Burgundy. If that doesn't help, then you should talk to professional, but we'd also recommend trying another Burgundy, just for good measure.

## Jura

*Parting with Burgundy is indeed sweet sorrow, but we have places to go and vineyards to discover. There are more wines in heaven and earth, Horatio, than just those in Burgundy, wonderful though they may be. Before going south to Lyon and the wines of Beaujolais, we're going to travel east across the Saône River for a quick visit to the intensely rural wine region of the Jura. Jura reds are made from Pinot Noir, Poulsard and Trousseau and are unique wines: crunchy red fruit, earthy and even a bit funky sometimes.*

## Beaujolais

Now we are free to continue our journey south along the Saône toward Beaujolais. Around the city of Mâcon, the soil abruptly changes from limestone, clay and sand to granite and granitic sands. Granite soils are to the Gamay grape what Abbey Road was to the Beatles. The grape can make okay wines in many places, but the granite of Beaujolais can propel Gamay to Revolver or Sgt. Pepper levels.

If your perception of Beaujolais is based on that industrial monstrosity known as Beaujolais Nouveau, then these bottles are going to blow your mind. Real Beaujolais is nothing like the bubblegum and banana flavored alcohol water that the worst examples of Nouveau have become. True Beaujolais shows similarities to Burgundy and when produced in one of the ten Cru villages, the wines are worthy rivals of some of the best of the Cote d'Or.

## Rhône Valley

Beaujolais, gone but not forgotten as we head south to the gluttony capital of France, Lyon, and meet up with the Rhone River. After leaving lake Geneva, the Rhône heads west to Lyon before turning abruptly south towards the Mediterranean. The Rhône Valley wine region is massive and is divided into the steep hillside vineyards of the north and the flat alluvial plain of the south.

## Northern Rhône

The Northern Rhône Valley is tiny in comparison to the southern valley and the vineyards are predominately on steep granite cliffs that are often terraced. Syrah is the only red grape allowed in Northern Rhone wines which tells you how well suited the grape is to these meager soils.

## Piemonte

*We say au revoir to France and head over the Alps into Northern Italy and prepare ourselves for a marathon of some of the world's greatest, and most distinctive, red wines. Some areas in Italy have been making high quality red wines for a century or more, but it wasn't until the '60s and '70s that most wine producing regions began to focus on high quality wines. This revolution was led by personalities such as Luigi Veronelli, who stressed to producers that great wine starts with the vineyard and respecting the grapes and soil is the key to quality. Now Italy's red wines take a back seat to no one, but don't take our word for it. Pull a cork and find our for yourself!*

*First stop on our Italian adventure is Piemonte, because we are too impulsive to save the best for last. The Nebbiolo grape, when planted in the rolling hills of limestone and clay that define Piemonte's most famous villages, Barolo and Barbaresco, is capable of producing spectacular wines that make us wonder why we would ever drink anything else. Piemonte and its capital, Turin, have been closely associated with France throughout history, even being ruled by Napoleon for a spell in the 19th century after the battle of Marengo (which spawned a famous chicken recipe). This close association is responsible for the Piemontese adopting French winemaking techniques much sooner and is also partly responsible for the trend of bottling single vineyards in Barolo and Barbaresco.*

Valtellina provides the perfect complement to the powerful Nebbiolo of Barolo/Barbaresco.*

## Veneto

*The Adige River is not exactly navigable, so we'll have to drive alongside as we leave Bolzano and head south to Verona, in the region of the Veneto. We are now in the former kingdom of Venice and the capital city is still the center of gravity for all of northeastern Italy. The distinctive red wines of Veneto are blends based predominately on the Corvina grape and many are made from grapes dried for months in ventilated lofts called fruttai. Veneto reds are rich and sensuous wines that closely mimic the feel of jumping naked into a pool of liquid velvet, and we all know exactly what that's like.*

## Tuscany

Central Italy is beckoning and we must heed the call. From Verona, we'll head south towards the rolling hills of Tuscany. Obviously, we'll stop in Bologna along the way for a hearty meal and a pile of Prosciutto di Parma, washed down with bottles of Lambrusco, as one does. Tuscany is where the continental climate gives way to Mediterranean and olive trees begin to heavily populate the landscape. Sangiovese is the most widely planted grape in Italy, but it's only in Tuscany where it achieves superstar status. Tuscany is a great place to get out of your comfort zone. Try a Chianti if you are a Burgundy drinker or a Brunello if you normally swig on Bordeaux or a Supertuscan if your thing is a big Napa Cab.

Historically, the cities of Florence and Sienna have skirmished over one of the most recognizable regions in wine: Chianti. That seems like a pretty good reason to open a bottle to see what all the fighting was about. This historical area is now known as Chianti Classico and is where most, but not all, of the best examples are made. Forget those 1980s straw covered flasks, these Chiantis are the real deal.

### La Rioja

*We meet up with the Ebro river at the edge of Catalonia and follow it inland until we reach Haro, the de facto capital of Rioja wine production. Rioja wine as we know it was essentially created by Bordeaux merchants at the end of the 1800s to compensate for the massive loss of vines in France due to a vicious little rascal endearingly known as Phylloxera vastatrix ("the devastator"). Made from a blend of Tempranillo, Garnacha (Grenache), Graciano and Mazuelo (Carignan) and traditionally aged in large American oak vats, Rioja has the ability to age and improve for decades.*

Morgan Twain-Peterson was born into Zinfandel royalty. His father, Joel, founded Ravenswood Winery in the 1970s and was a pioneer in making high quality and age worthy Zinfandels from some of the oldest vineyards in the U.S. Morgan was steeped in winemaking from old vines from an early age and now produces wines from many of the ancient vineyards still remaining in California. Morgan and his partner, Chris Cottrell, have become protectors of these old vineyards, sometimes saving them from destruction due to their painfully low yields. The results are oh so good: deeply complex and fascinating wines produced from 100+ year old vines of mixed varieties that will tell you their story from the pop of the cork to the last drop in the glass.
